

LCU ACCREDITATION REAFFIRMED WITH NO FINDINGS OF NONCOMPLIANCE

Louisiana Christian University has received full reaffirmation of accreditation with no findings of noncompliance in its regular 10-year review. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC), LCU's accrediting body, officially notified the university in December of the reaffirmation with no additional report necessary. The next reaffirmation will be in 2031.

NOBTS AND LCU ANNOUNCE PARTNERSHIP

Officials from Louisiana Christian University (LCU) and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary (NOBTS) signed a historical partnership agreement April 13.

The partnership re-affirms transfer options for LCU graduates who study in the NOBTS Accelerated Master of Divinity program (M.Div.) established in 2019. The new agreement offers NOBTS students the opportunity to transfer credits toward the Master of Business Administration (MBA) and Master of Social Work (MSW) degrees. The partnership will expand the training options available for God-called men and women in Louisiana and help students save time and money.

MBA PROPOSAL

The Prospectus for the MBA program has been submitted to SACSCOC for approval. Applications may be accepted but admission will not begin until the program receives formal approval.

TRANSITION TO NAIA

Completing the process that was announced earlier in the summer of 2021, the Louisiana Christian University's Athletics Department received word that the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) membership committee has approved our application for admission, making official the move to the NAIA as well as finalizing the new conference affiliations with the Red River Athletic Conference (RRAC) and Sooner Athletic Conference (SAC).

NOTEWORTHY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

It was a season of historic firsts for the Louisiana Christian University women's soccer program, including first double digit win season, first winning season, first postseason appearance, first conference championship, and first National Tournament appearance. Additionally, for the first time in the program's history, the Louisiana Christian University women's soccer team can boast an All-American as Martina Terra Garcia rode her 22-goal season to a NAIA All-American honorable mention nod.

Men's basketball has clinched its fourth consecutive tournament appearance this season, with significant contribution from Kae'ron Baker, who earned five conference Player of the Week awards. His success and dedication earned his jersey a spot in retirement. Kae'ron was also named All-American Second Team, RRAC Player of the Year, 1st Team All-Conference, & NAIA Scoring Champion .



Refurbishment & Campus Improvements

LCU has begun the process of completing all upgrades to the *WIFI Network* on campus, including dorms. Expected completion of that project is June 1. Many software projects are in progress to produce efficiencies within our student on-boarding process. Also, the Information Technology department secured a vendor to assist with re-configuring all network switches on campus thereby improving the speed and dependability of our network.

Over the last year security has added additional lights and cameras to enhance the safety of students and faculty while on campus. There are now over 100 cameras located around the premises.

In addition, *RAVE Guardian*, a free mobile app that turns your smartphone into a personal safety device, is now being utilized by students. This allows

students, faculty, or staff to notify security with the touch of a button from anywhere on or off campus.

To help keep illegal narcotics off campus, LCU now has a certified narcotic K-9. Affectionately known as “Rex,” this K-9 is highly trained and will be attending all campus events and affairs.

Staff and chosen students will soon begin *Crisis Intervention Training*. This training will hopefully help to reduce the risk of serious injury or death during an emergency interaction between persons with mental illness and police officers.

Lastly, we are currently in the process of adding keyless entry into all buildings. We believe this addition will help to further our security efforts and continue to push us forward in keeping our students, faculty, and staff safe.

The Center for Calling & Career

The Center for Calling and Career provides a one-stop shop for students seeking internships, career advice and information about jobs available in their major. Many of our students sometimes question their calling or do not know what they want to “do” with their education. We are excited to help our students prepare for meaningful work while discovering their spiritual gifts. Our mission in the Center for Career and Calling is to engage students as early as possible—ideally, from their first day on campus or even beforehand as prospective students.

Over the past year, the Center for Calling and Career has successfully hosted the following student workshops and events:

In addition, all freshmen take a career assessment as a part of their Freshman Year Experience while we help them discover their personal spiritual gifts and how the two work hand in hand.

We have 37 internships this spring past semester alone. We have also completed close to 300 career assessments.

We are working with local, regional and national business and industry in an effort to provide our students one of kind internship and service-learning opportunities. There is an added benefit for business and industry to work with our students whether through service-learning or an internship to see the difference in our students and how valuable they can be to the organization upon graduation.





Faith Integration

Regardless of the subject, faith is the foundational aspect of everything we do. Outside of the classroom, there are many opportunities on campus which point students to Christ and encourage a deeper walk with Him.

One of those opportunities is our *C3 (Christ, Church, and Culture)*. This year's speakers addressed a variety of culturally relevant topics and encouraged students to see these issues from a biblical lens and to stand firm in faith as cultural changes and battles rage against not only individual believers, but also against the church.

Coach Dale Clayton, Vice President of Coaches Ministries at Nations of Coaches, addressed Critical Race Theory from a biblical perspective. He challenged students to understand that CRT has no place for the Gospel.

Britney Jones, the Director of Advocacy for Family Policy Alliance of Kansas, challenged students to be heard in the marketplace and to have an impact on the emptiness of society.

Greg Baylor and Shannon Kendrick, both from the Alliance Defending Freedom, highlighted proposed legislation, such as the Equality Act, and how those legal changes would impact the church.

Apologist *Frank Turek*, President of Cross Examined, was our final C3 speaker for the year. Dr. Frank Turek appealed to the philosophical argument of why it takes more faith to be an Atheist than a Christian and backed his defence by not only the Bible, but also by logic and historical writings.

Another opportunity is our God in the Workplace. *Dr. Richard Blackaby*, President of Blackaby Ministries International, was our keynote speaker for God in the Workplace. Dr. Blackaby shared from his vast experience with Christian business people being "uniquely equipped to lead companies that not only make a profit but bless the staff and customers as well."


Graduates of the Jonathan E. Martin Master of Business Administration will:

LCU's 167th Commencement

Congresswoman Julia Letlow delivered a message centered on hope and faith, as the commencement speaker for the first graduating class from Louisiana Christian University. Louisiana Christian University achieved university status in the fall of 2021.

LCU conferred 249 degrees – 171 undergraduate and 78 graduate – at its 167th Commencement Exercises Saturday.

“You have proven yourselves diligent, dedicated, disciplined, and determined, or you wouldn’t be sitting where you are today,” Letlow told the Class of 2022. “And though you may feel some things have finally come to a conclusion, the truth is you are just beginning. You are on the threshold of something new and fresh and fulfilling.”

Both she and LCU President Dr. Rick Brewer remarked and applauded this year’s class, who faced an unprecedented number of challenges outside of their control—in addition to the normal college stressors—hurricanes, tornadoes, and two years of COVID quarantines, masks, isolation and distance learning.

“I wholeheartedly believe that these past few years have provided you with more opportunities for growth, adaptability, resilience and lessons than many who have come before you,” Letlow said. “In facing this health crisis of gigantic proportions, your training on this campus has already undoubtedly prepared you for a world that doesn’t always go as planned. And it won’t. Life is unpredictable – tough and beautiful, all at the same time.”

Letlow shared from her heart the devastating loss of her husband, Luke, to complications from COVID-19 in December 2020, just days before he was to be sworn into the office that she now holds. She had a toddler and an infant and a full-time position at the University of Louisiana Monroe at the time.

“It was during this immensely difficult time in my life that the Lord showed me that two things can be true at once,” she said. “A person can be full of grief and still choose hope for the future. And it is that



message of hope put into action that I want to impart to you today. Always choose hope!”

“As you move forward from this day, you will find that life will be full of many mountaintops, but there will also be valleys you will have to walk through. And as much as your parents and I would love nothing more than to shield you from them, they are a part of this life for a reason. When these trials find you, I encourage you to lean into the hurt. Feel it. Be curious about what it is there to teach you. Learn from it, be transformed by it. And then the most important part: Don’t stay in it, yet choose to continue moving forward with hope.”

Four distinguished graduates offered their thoughts of their time at LCU: Trinity Foster, of Deville; Hosie Thomas III, of Shreveport; Erich Loewer, of Crowley; and Vaylon DuBois, of Pollock. And 2021-22 Class President Kyaus Washington, of Alexandria, encouraged his fellow graduates on their next journey.

Brewer told graduates they would each receive two diplomas because they were a unique class.

“You are the first graduates of Louisiana Christian University. You started at Louisiana College, but you finished at Louisiana Christian University,” said Brewer, greeted by much applause.

“God is looking for a generation to raise up to be Christian thinkers, no matter what occupation you go into,” he said. “LCU seeks to prepare graduates and transform lives. Lives that are transformed, transform communities, transform culture, transform families, and transform all the people they come in contact with.”
